Need to replace a power-steering pump, engine or transmission for your car? Think about buying a recycled one. Not only will you save money — a new power-steering pump can cost \$160, a rebuilt one not quite \$100, but a recycled one can be as low as \$35 — and you'll save the environment, too.

Based on an annual average of 7 million vehicles processed in the United States alone, the automotive recycling industry recycles more than 2 million tons of cast iron, 7 million tons of steel and a half-million tons of aluminum each year. It also saves the energy needed to turn raw materials into finished parts.
